

<p><b>Geography in Nursery</b></p> <p>Children begin learning about their immediate local environment such as the different parts of the school. They start looking at features such as buildings, paths and trees. They learn that the weather can be different each day and learn about how the environment changes during the seasons. They will start to be aware that there are different places in the world such as land and sea.</p>	<p><b>Geography in Reception</b></p> <p>Children begin learning about their local environment, such as the streets, parks and woods close to Killigrew. They will explore simple maps and begin creating their own representations of maps and journeys. They will begin to learn about different cities and countries and will be encouraged to talk about places they have visited, or places where family members live. They will begin to recognise some environments that are different to the one in which they live and start to pick out differences and similarities between these. They will understand links between seasons and weather.</p>
<p><b>Nursery Linked topics:</b></p> <p><b>All Around Me</b>- learning about our school</p> <p><b>Bigger and Bigger</b>- looking at how the environment changes in the spring</p> <p><b>Building and Making</b> – looking at the features of buildings</p> <p><b>Splash</b>- exploring weather and our school grounds</p>	<p><b>Reception Linked topics:</b></p> <p><b>Healthy Me</b>- learning about our local environment</p> <p><b>Traditional Tales</b>- looking at stories set in different countries</p> <p><b>Around the World</b> – learning more about specific countries</p> <p><b>Up in the Air</b>- exploring maps through journeys linked to flight and to space</p>
<p><b>How can I help at home?</b></p> <p>Talk to your child about the weather each day. You might like to make your own weather chart. Involve your child in choosing appropriate clothes linked to the weather.</p> <p>Play “I spy” when out and about, focusing on features such as shops, bus stops, roads, street signs, trees.</p> <p>As you walk or drive, talk through your journey and point out features such as roundabouts, buildings.</p> <p>Join in with seasonal scavenger hunts such as looking for acorns and conkers in the autumn. Point out features such as land, sea, mountains and rivers when reading stories.</p>	<p><b>How can I help at home?</b></p> <p>Refer to a child friendly calendar each day and discuss the month and season to help your child to make links between them.</p> <p>Look at maps and globes together and talk about the different countries.</p> <p>If you visit a different country, or have relatives living in a different country, talk about the similarities and differences such as the weather and the animals that live there.</p> <p>Encourage your child to use small world toys such as bricks to build familiar places such as their home, school and local shops.</p> <p>Look for maps when out and about, such as a map of the local park or a map of the town centre. Play I-spy with features on the map.</p>
